RACING NEWS, w/Nan Carnal, Sierra League Race Director

As many or most of you know, scheduling race venues this year is a big challenge. Resorts have suspended racing or are still trying to hire new race program staff (including race directors), thus they are not currently scheduling racing for the upcoming winter season.

At this point, our still developing race schedule has 3 dates:

- Saturday, February 11, GS at Alpine Meadows,
- ◆ Sunday, February 12, GS at Northstar—Back by popular demand
- Friday, March 17 (Saint Patrick's Day-we will likely party!), Slalom at Alpine Meadows.

The two above resorts do not have additional dates available. We are waiting and hoping that other resorts we have contacted will have racing staff and be able to host our races.

Thus, that is our current status. Accordingly, until we have a full schedule or have to just utilize what we have, the Board is unable to determine the season race pass fee.

Stay tuned for future updates, put dates listed above in your calendars, and keep your fingers crossed that we can acquire additional race venues.

SPORT PARTICIPANT RELEASE OF LIABILITY, WAIVER OF CLAIMS, EXPRESS ASSUMPTION OF RISK AND INDEMNITY AGREEMENT.

Express Assumption of Risk Associated with Spor	ort. Venue Use and Related Activities.

I, ______ do hereby affirm and acknowledge that I have been fully informed of the inherent hazards and risks associated with all activities of Sierra League & Council including but not limited to alpine skiing, snowboarding, tubing, and tobogganing, and certain additional risks, dangers and hazards including, but not limited to boarding, riding, and disembarking ski lifts, transportation of equipment related to the activities, and traveling to and from activity sites in which I am about to engage. Inherent hazards and risks include but are not limited to:

- 1. Risk of injury from the activity and equipment utilized is significant including the potential for broken bones, severe injuries to the head, neck, and back or other bodily injuries that my result in permanent disability and death.
- 2. Possible equipment failure and/or malfunction or misuse of my own or others' equipment.
- I AGREE THAT I WILL WEAR APPROVED PROTECTIVE GEAR AS DECREED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE SPORT I AM PARTICIPATING IN.
 However, protective gear cannot guarantee the participant's safety. I further agree that no helmet can protect the wearer against all potential head injuries or prevent injury to the wearer's face, neck or spinal cord.
- 4. Variation and/or steepness of terrain, variation or changes in surfaces including but not limited to snow surfaces, ice, bare spots, rocks, stumps, debris, cliffs, trees, fences, posts, trees, light poles, signs, buildings, roads, walkways, ramps, rails, stairs, pyramids, manual pads, bowls, half-pipes, jumps, padded and non-padded barriers, other persons, and other natural and man-made hazards.
- My own negligence and/or the negligence of others, including but not limited to operator error and guide decision making including misjudging terrain, weather, riding surfaces or other obstacles.
- 6. Exposure to the elements and temperature extremes may result if frost nip, frost bite, heat exhaustion, heat stroke, sunburn, hypothermia and dehydration.
- Dangers associated with exposure to natural elements include but are not limited to avalanche, rock fall, inclement weather, thunder and lighting, severe and or varied wind, temperature and other weather conditions.
- 8. Accidents or illness occurring in remote places where there are no available medical facilities.
- 9. Fatigue, exhaustion, chill, and/or dizziness, which may diminish my/our reaction time and increase the risk of accident.
- 10. Impact or collision with other athletes, spectators, facility employees, pedestrians, motor vehicles, and cyclists.
- *I understand the description of these risks is not complete and unknown or unanticipated risks may result in injury, illness, or death.

Release of Liability, Waiver of Claims and Indemnity Agreement

In consideration for being permitted to participate in the above described activity(ies) and related activities, I hereby agree, acknowledge and appreciate that::

- I HEREBY RELEASE AND HOLD HARMLESS WITH RESPECT TO ANY AND ALL INJURY, DISABILITY, DEATH, or loss or damage to person or property, WHETHER CAUSED BY NEGLIGENCE OR OTHERWISE, the following named persons or entities, herein referred to as releasees: Sierra League & Council and their directors and officers, and their successors and assigns.
- 2. To release the releasees, their officers, directors, employees, representatives, agents, and volunteers from liability and responsibility whatsoever and for any claims or causes of action that I, my estate, heirs, survivors, executors, or assigns may have for personal injury, property damage, or wrongful death arising from the above activities whether caused by active or passive negligence of the releasees or otherwise. By executing this document, I agree to hold the releasees harmless and indemnify them in conjunction with any injury, disability, death, or loss or damage to person or property that may occur as a result of my engaging in the above activities.
- 3. By entering into this Agreement, I am not relying on any oral or written representation or statements made by the releasees, other than what is set forth in this Agreement.

SAFETY - Safe Winter Driving

With the snow flying, it is good to review safe driving tips prior to heading to the slopes. The following advice is from the Nevada Department of Transportation website:

"Nevada winters can bring harsh and quickly-changing weather conditions. Driving hazards such as limited visibility, black ice, avalanche-prone areas and snow removal equipment are just some elements that may be encountered on winter roads.

The Nevada Department of Transportation works hard and effectively to clear Nevada roads for safe winter travel, with maintenance experts plowing and applying anti-icing and de-icing chemicals and sand to keep winter roads safe for winter driving.

Before driving, motorists can dial 511 (1-877-NV-ROADS outside of Nevada) or log on to www.nvroads.com for Nevada state road conditions.

SAFE WINTER DRIVING TIPS:

- Only travel in winter weather when necessary, leave enough time to safely reach your destination and plan your route to avoid snowy/icy areas and steep hills
- Before driving, check weather and road conditions by dialing 511 within Nevada (or 1-877-NV-ROADS outside of Nevada)
- Share your travel itinerary so others know when to expect you
- Remove snow & ice from all vehicle windows, mirrors, lights, turn signals and license plates
- Buckle up
- Turn on headlights to see and be seen
- Turn off cruise control



- Avoid quick starts, stops and fast turns. Accelerate, brake and steer smoothly and gradually
- Reduce speed. Speed limits are based on normal road and weather conditions, not winter road conditions
- Do not slam on brakes. Apply steady pressure on ABS-equipped vehicles and pump the brakes if necessary on non-ABS vehicles
- Always comply with all posted chain requirements
- If your vehicle has snow tires, install and use them between October 1 and April 30
- Keep additional distance from other vehicles

SAFETY - Safe Winter Driving (continued)

SAFE WINTER DRIVING TIPS (CONT.):

- Do not pass without good distance and sight clearance
- Watch carefully for snow removal equipment
- Use extra caution on bridges, ramps, overpasses and shaded areas- they may freeze first
- Maintain a high fuel level
- If vehicle begins to skid, steer in direction of slide and slowly remove foot from accelerator
- Be aware of black ice
- If parked or stuck in snow, leave window slightly cracked for ventilation and make sure vehicle exhaust system is clear of snow
- Always carry tire chains, especially when traveling in mountain passes or typically snowy areas
- Remember: 4-wheel-drive vehicles cannot necessarily turn or stop any better than 2wheel-drive vehicles

CARRY WITH YOU:

- Tire chains / tow strap
- Flashlight and Spare batteries
- Ice scraper
- Cell phone for emergency communication (do not use while driving)
- Snow shovel
- Flares
- Jumper cables
- Small bag of sand for wheel traction
- Extra winter clothes / coat / gloves / socks
- Blanket or sleeping bag
- Non-perishable foods / water
- First aid supplies / prescription medication
- Battery-operated radio
- Candles / matches or lighter
- State map for navigation in event of winter detour



SAFETY - Safe Winter Driving (continued)



Year in and year out, the Nevada Department of Transportation secures roadways from harsh winters with expert personnel, technology and dedication.

Training/Equipment

- * NDOT snow equipment operators undertake extensive winter operations training.
- * Most NDOT snow equipment are multi-use workhorses, used to plow in winter and perform other duties in summer.

Technology

- Liquid anti-icers are applied to roads in advance of ice or snow to help prevent roadway icing.
- * Thick, sturdy sand is used on roads during winter snow removal. This sturdy sand does not break down as easily, reducing particulates released into the air.
- * NDOT road weather information systems pinpoint roads needing salt, sand or brine, greatly reducing use of all three products.
- State-of-the-art, computerized salt and sand spreaders allow extreme precision and efficiency of salt/ sand use.

SNOWPLOW SAFETY:

- Use caution when following, passing or pproaching snow removal equipment
- Drive a safe distance behind snowplows. Plows often travel slower than other vehicles to remove snow, apply sand and liquid anti-icers and assist stranded vehicles
- Before attempting to pass snow removal equipment, check direction of snow discharge to avoid snow and debris thrown from equipment. Remember - plows are wider than most vehicles and portions of the plow and blade may be obscured by blowing snow
- Don't crowd the plow.
- Only pass snow removal vehicles when a safe, legal passing area is available and adequately clear of snow and/ or treated with salt and sand
- Don't travel beside a snowplow. They can shift sideways after hitting snow packs or drifts
- When a plow approaches you, allow the plow room to operate by reducing speed and moving to the right side of the road if there is room to safely do so
- Do not brake with unnecessary sudden movements when in front of a snowplow - plows cannot stop as quickly as an automobile
- Don't drive through white out conditions caused by swirling snow around a snowplow. Safely pull to the side or slow to allow visibility to improve
- Remember that a snowplow operator's field of vision is restricted. You may see them, but they may not see you

Ski industry news from the National Ski Club News, National Ski Council

Historic Climate Bill Expected to Benefit Ski Industry. The package includes the largest climate, energy, and environmental justice investment (\$370 billion) in U.S. history, from which the U.S. ski industry stands to benefit. SAM

Ski and Sports Shops See Impact of Russia-Ukraine War on Equipment Supplies. Ukraine is one of the biggest producers of winter sports equipment in Europe, producing hundreds of thousands of skis and snowboards each year. Certain brands may be hard to come by this snow season as disruptions in ski production from the war could rupture the supply chain. Sacramento Bee via Stars and Stripes

After Apocalyptic Lift Lines Last Year, Vail Resorts will Limit Ticket Sales this Winter. Daily tickets at all of the company's 37 North American resorts will be capped, but Epic Pass holders will not be affected. *Ski Magazine*

Vail Resorts Drops Vaccine Requirements, Will Limit Day Tickets. Vail Resorts has updated its Covid protocols, dropping vaccine requirements for guests and staff, and will limit day ticket sales for the upcoming winter season, according to its 2022-23 operating plan. Across all its resorts, the company will no longer require face coverings, vaccines, or dining reservations for guests. SAM

Indy Pass Adds Mountain High and Dodge Ridge in Calif. Indy Pass has added two more resorts to its growing list of partners for the 2022-23 season: Mountain High and Dodge Ridge, Calif. The additions bring Indy Pass's total alpine and Nordic resort partners to 106. SAM

Big Rock, Maine Gets \$2.5 Million Boost from U.S. Department of Commerce. The U.S. Department of Commerce's Economic Development Authority (EDA) has awarded a \$2.5 million grant to Big Rock Mountain to boost tourism by supporting investment into a new chairlift and increased snowmaking capacity at the Mars Hill, Maine, ski area. Big Snow, Mich. Acquisition Closed, Renames as Snowriver Mountain Resort. Charles Skinner Jr. has closed on the acquisition of Big Snow Resort, which includes Indianhead and Blackjack ski areas, all of which will be renamed with new branding. Big Snow will transition to Snowriver Mountain Resort, the Indianhead area will be called Jackson Creek Summit, and Blackjack will be Black River Basin SAM

Ikon Pass Adds Lotte Arai, Japan and Panorama, B.C. Alterra Mountain Company's Ikon Pass has added Lotte Arai Resort in Japan and Panorama Mountain Resort in British Columbia. With the additions, the pass will provide access to more than 50 destinations in 10 countries for the 2022-23 season. SAM

With the additions, Indy Pass holders will have two days of access to 96 alpine ski areas and 13 Nordic ski areas in North America and Japan SAM

Mountain Collective Adds Sugar Bowl. The Mountain Collective Pass has added Sugar Bowl, Calif., to its now 25-destination roster. The Tahoe resort joins Sun Valley, Snowbasin, Marmot Basin, and Le Massif de Charlevoix as new partners for upcoming season. SAM

Ikon Pass Adds Sun Peaks, Grandvalira Resorts Andorra. Ikon Pass has added Sun Peaks Resort in British Columbia and Grandvalira Resorts Andorra in Andorra for the 2022–23 season. With five other partners added earlier this year—Chamonix Mont-Blanc Valley, France, Sun Valley, Idaho, Snowbasin, Utah, Lotte Arai Resort, Japan, and Panorama, B.C.—Ikon Pass holders will now have access to more than 50 mountain destinations in 11 countries. Telluride Renews Epic Pass Partnership with Vail Resorts. Vail Resorts and Telluride renewed their partnership for an undisclosed number of years. The terms remain the same: Full Epic Pass holders get seven days at Telluride with no blackouts.
